DIVORCED AND RE-MARRIED? If you are divorced and remarried outside of the Catholic Church without a Decree of Nullity/Invalidity, or if you are a Catholic and are married outside of the Catholic Church, you may not partake of the Sacraments, including the reception of Holy Communion. Until it is shown otherwise through the ministry of the Tribunal, no person is free to enter into another marriage without the appearance or occasion of serious sin. However, a divorce alone does not affect or hinder in any way, your participation in the Sacraments. A divorced Catholic is free to receive the sacraments. However, if you are divorced and have remarried, or if you are divorced and in a new relationship, or if you are living with someone without a Decree of Nullity/Invalidity (and your former spouse is still living) you may not partake of the sacraments, including the reception of Holy Communion. Consider seeking a Decree of Nullity/Invalidity which will enable you to return to a full participation in the sacramental life of the Church. CATECHISM IN A YEAR

What is a Christian house of prayer?

A Christian house of prayer is both a sign of the ecclesial communion of people at a specific place and also a symbol of the heavenly dwellings that God has prepared for us all. In God's house we gather together to pray in common or alone and to celebrate the sacraments, especially the Eucharist.

"It smells like heaven here." "Here you can be very quiet and reverent." Many churches surround us perceptibly in a thick atmosphere of prayer. We sense that God is present here. The beauty of church buildings directs our attention to the beauty, greatness, and love of God. Churches are not just stone messengers of the faith, but dwelling places of God, who is really and truly and substantially present in the sacrament of the altar.

What liturgical spaces define a house of God?

The central places of a house of God are the altar with the crucifix, the tabernacle, the celebrant's chair, the ambo, the baptismal font, and the confessional.

The altar is the central point of the church. On it Jesus Christ's sacrifice on the cross and resurrection are made present in the celebration of the Eucharist. It is also the table to which the People of God are invited. The tabernacle, a kind of sacred safe, houses with the greatest honor in a most worthy place in the church the Eucharistic species in which the Lord himself is present. The so-called perpetual lamp indicates that the tabernacle is "occupied". If the lamp is not burning, the tabernacle is empty. The raised chair (Latin cathedra) of the bishop or the priest means that ultimately Christ is the one who leads the congregation. The ambo (from Greek *anabainein* = to climb up), the lectern for the Word of God, should manifest the value and dignity of the biblical readings as the word of the living God. Baptisms are performed at the baptismal font, and the holy water font should be a vivid reminder of our baptismal promises. A confessional or confession room is there so that we can acknowledge our guilt and receive forgiveness.

FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY, AND JOSEPH

Say yes to the unknown

It is good and right to hold Jesus' family in the highest esteem. But in reality we have very few details about their daily lives. When we search scripture for clues we learn that Joseph and Mary each said *yes* to the unknown as they accepted the responsibility of parenthood. In truth, that is the situation encountered by every parent. We embrace the gift of life and do our best to parent and bring our children closer to God. But it is not a clear science. It is indeed entering the unknown with a sacrificial *yes* that allows every parent to share in the creative work of God. On this third day of Christmas, give the gift of gratitude to a parent you know.

FEAST OF THE HOLY INNOCENTS, MARTYRS

Let them be heard

"Children should be seen and not heard." Aristophanes voiced this maxim in 423 B.C. By the 15th century, a clergyman's sermon amended it to "A maiden should be seen but not heard," and four centuries later Thackeray agreed that "little girls" are properly silent. B.W. Bellamy's 1915 *Table Rules for Little Folks* restores the original idea that children are best seen and silent. However you say it, this idea leaves the most vulnerable members of society open to bullying, violence, and abuse. On this fourth day of Christmas, give the gift of your attention to children.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John 1:5-2:2; Matthew 2:13-18 (698). "A voice was heard in Ramah . . . Rachel weeping for her children, and she would not be consoled."*

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 29

FEAST OF THOMAS BECKET, BISHOP, MARTYR

Speak truth to power

In 1162, King Henry II of England appointed his good friend Thomas Becket as archbishop of Canterbury, which was the most powerful church position in the country. The king was hoping Becket would be his political puppet, but Becket realized his duty and out of principle refused to yield control of the church in England to the throne, and because of his stance he was martyred. When you're given responsibilities, remember that you're responsible to the people you serve, not the ones who got you there.
